12.8 sparkling (adj) /'spa:kliŋ/ - jiskřivý shining brightly ● *They sat on the shore,*

12.9 flow (v) /fləʊ/ - téci move continuously and easily ● *The river* flows through the valley into the Mediterranean Sea. >> flow (n) ❖

calmly and softly • She lifted the baby gently and held him in her arms. ➤ gentle (adj) ❖

12.11 incidence (n) /'insidəns/ - výskyt the rate at which sth happens ● *The researchers found an increased incidence of the disease in people over 70.* ➤ incident (n), incidental (adj) ❖

12.12 depression (n) /dıˈpreʃn/ - deprese a medical condition in which a person feels very unhappy and anxious over a long period ● *She suffers from depression and cannot sleep at night.* ➤ depress (v), depressed (adj) ❖

12.13 sit through (phr v) /sit θru:/ - prosedět; protrpět stay until the end of sth, especially if it is boring or lasts a long time ● *We managed to sit through two hours of speeches.* ❖ **12.14 birdsong** (n) / 'bɜːdsɒŋ/ - ptačí zpěv the musical sounds that birds make ● *The only thing we could hear among the*

show (a feeling) or show signs of (a type of behaviour) ● She displayed great confidence in her abilities during the

12.18 violent (adj) / vaiələnt/ - násilný using force in order to attack sb ● *The film* contains violent scenes and is not suitable for children. > violence (n) ❖

12.19 disconnected (adj) / diskə nektid/ oddělený

not related; having no relationship with ● I felt lonely and disconnected from the world around me. > disconnect (v), disconnection (n) ❖ ⑤ Opp: connected 12.20 cactus (n) / kæktəs/ - kaktus a plant without leaves that grows in hot dry areas and doesn't need much water • Cacti are probably the only plants you will see in the desert. &

12.38 liver (n) /ˈlivə(r)/ - játra the large organ inside your body that cleans your blood ● Drinking alcohol can damage your liver. ❖

12.39 muscle (n) /'mʌsl/ - sval body tissue that you relax or make tight in order to move a part of your body ● Runners develop powerful leg muscles. ❖ 12.40 rib (n) /rɪb/ - žebro one of the bones that surround and protect the chest ● He broke three of his ribs in the accident. ❖

12.41 thigh (n) /θai/ - stehno the part of your leg that is above the knee • Cycling is the best way to exercise your thighs. ❖

12.42 toenail (n) /'təʊneil/ - nehet na prstu u nohy the thin hard covering that protects the end of each toe ● *He's finding it difficult to cut his toenails now that he's growing older. ❖*

12.43 waist (n) /weist/ - pas the area around the middle of your body, which is usually narrower than the rest
• He wore a wide black belt around his waist. ❖

12.44 wrist (n) /rist/ - zápěstí the part of your body between the arm and the hand ● *She was wearing bracelets round both of her wrists.* ❖

12.45 torso (n) /'tɔːsəʊ/ - trup the main part of the body, without the head, arms or legs ● He took off his shirt and revealed a tanned torso. ❖

12.46 get (sth) off my chest (expr) /get ('sʌmθɪŋ) pf maı tʃest/ - ulevit si; vypovídat se

tell sb about sth that has been worrying you for a long time in order to feel better

 I think you should tell him everything and get it off your chest!

12.47 blink (v) /blink/ - mrkat close and then open your eyes quickly

• He blinked as he came out into the sunlight. ➤ blink (n) ❖

a blue or brown mark on your skin that

you get after you have been hit or after falling ● She was covered with bruises after falling off her bike. ➤ bruise (v) ❖ 12.49 disability (n) / disə biləti/ - postižení a condition in which you are unable to use part of your body or your brain because of an illness or injury ● In most countries, public places are becoming more accessible for people with disabilities. ➤ disable (v), disabled (adj) ❖

12.50 reaction (n) /ri'æk∫n/ - reakce an unpleasant effect that results from eating sth or taking a particular drug ● Don't continue taking the pills if you notice a bad reaction. ➤ react (v), reactive (adj) ❖

a mark that is left on a part of your body

12.54 swollen (adj) /swəʊlən/ - oteklý larger than normal, usually because of an injury or illness ● Your wrist is swollen – it must be broken, I'm afraid. ➤ swell (v), swelling (n) ❖

12.102 value for money (expr) /'vælju: fə 'mʌni/ - za ty peníze to stojí worth the money you spend on it ● *I know our washing machines aren't cheap, but they're good value for money as they last for over ten years. ❖*

12.103 hi-tech (adj) /ˈhɑɪˈtek/ technologicky špičkový
using the most advanced machines and
methods ● Our computers are hi-tech,
using the latest components and
technology. ❖ ⑤ Also: high-tech
12.104 neat (adj) /niːt/ - čistý; uklizený
tidy and in order ● He always keeps his
desk extremely neat. ➤ neatly (adv)

12.105 out-of-date (adj) / aʊt əv 'deit/ - zastaralý

old and not fashionable ● I've had my smartphone for five years and it's now hopelessly out-of-date. ❖

12.106 overpriced (adj) / əʊvə praist/ - předražený

too expensive ● *I agree it's high quality,* but it's still overpriced. ❖

12.107 reasonable (adj) /ˈriːznəbl/ - rozumný

not too expensive; at an acceptable price

 That's a very reasonable price to pay for a new computer.
 ♣ ⑤ Opp: unreasonable 12.108 state-of-the-art (adj) / steit əv ði 'a:t/ - supermoderní very modern; using the most modern techniques ● This laptop is state-of-the-art, but of course it isn't cheap. ❖
12.109 bear in mind (expr) /beər in maind/ - mít na paměti remember or consider sb/sth ● The price may look cheap, but bear in mind that it doesn't include everything. ❖

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12.110 vaccine (n) /'væksi:n/ - vakcína a substance that a doctor puts into your blood to protect you from a disease ● *The vaccine can protect you against many types of flu.* ➤ vaccinate (v), vaccination (n) ❖

12.111 smallpox (n) /'smɔːlpɒks/ - neštovice

a disease that caused a high temperature and spots on the skin and often resulted in death • Smallpox killed millions of indigenous people when it arrived in the Americas. ❖

12.112 anthrax (n) /ˈænθræks/ - antrax a serious disease that sheep and cows can get and pass on to humans and which often causes death ● The poor farm worker caught anthrax from a cow. ❖
12.113 cholera (n) /ˈkɒlərə/ - cholera a serious disease of the bowels that can cause death ● You can catch cholera from infected water or food. ❖

12.114 typhoid (n) / taifoid/ - tyfus a serious disease that causes a high temperature, red spots on the chest, pain in the bowels and sometimes death ● Many people died of typhoid before the vaccine was invented. ❖

12.115 pasteurisation (n) – pasterizace / pæstʃərai zeɪʃn/
the process of heating a liquid such as milk and then cooling it, in order to kill dangerous bacteria • Pasteurisation kills

over 90% of harmful bacteria in milk. ➤ pasteurise (v) ❖

12.116 veterinarian (n) / vetərı neəriən/ veterinař

a person whose job is to treat animals who are ill or injured ● I'm passionate about animals and nature so I'm going to try and become a veterinarian. ❖ ⑤ Syn: vet, veterinary surgeon

12.117 infectious (adj) /ınˈfekʃəs/ - nakažlivý

that can be passed from one person to another • The disease is highly infectious, so patients must be isolated. ➤ infect (v), infection (n) ❖

12.118 virtually (adv) /ˈvɜːtʃuəli/ - v podstatě

almost ● The two pictures are virtually identical. There are only very slight differences between them. ❖

12.119 microorganism (n)

/ˌmaɪkrəʊˈɔːgənɪzəm/ - mikroorganismus a living thing that is so small you cannot see it without a microscope • Bacteria and viruses are microorganisms. �

12.120 kill (sth) off (phr v) /kil ('sʌmθɪŋ) pf/ - vyhubit; vymýtit destroy completely • *This cream can kill off all bacteria*. ❖

12.121 intestine (n) /in'testin/ - střevo a long tube inside the body that food passes through after it leaves the stomach • Digested food passes from the stomach into the small intestine. ➤ intestinal (adj) ❖ Syn: bowel
